Lobster hatchery to be created at Seafood Centre

A mble Development Trust has learned that it is to be awarded £180,000 by the Big Lottery Fund to set up a lobster hatchery.

The Trust applied for the grant in May.

Trust Director Julia Aston said, "I first had the idea six or seven years ago, but at the time there was no funding to make a grant for such a project.

"Since then the Big Lottery has come into being, and consultants, advising four years ago on the Harbour Village project, said that a hatchery would attract tourists, as well as being needed because of reducing stocks in the sea.

"Mike Hardy, the Chief Executive of Northumberland Inshore Fisheries Conservation Authority said that a lobster hatchery was needed in our area because of the increasing reliance of fishermen on shellfish."

Berried hens (pregnant female lobsters) will be gathered from the sea round Amble and put into tanks in the Seafood Centre. Once hatched, the developing lobsters will be put through a successsion of tanks until, after two or three months, they are big enough to be put back into the sea.

Visitors will be able to see this process via information boards, interactive panels and the tanks themselves. There may also be an opportunity for them to handle lobsters.

"We intend to be putting about 20,000 lobsters back into the sea each year," said Julia, "although they won't all survive of course."

They are hoping to mark the new lobsters so they can evaluate how the scheme is working.

Hotel plans on view to public

Plans for Amble's new hotel have been on display at a public consultation day. The development will consist of 30 bedrooms, with a mix of family, and twin rooms. On the ground floor will be a restaurant/ bar and outside terrace, together with a children's play area.

The project is being managed, financed and built by Arch, a development organisation owned by Northumberland County Council.

Architect Graeme Wood of BXB architects told The Ambler that the plans had been developed to blend in with the surroundings. "We've been working closely with the hotel operator, whom I can't name for confidentiality reasons.

"We wanted it to be sympathetic to the location, hence a two storey bedroom block, to look like it's always been here and possibly extended. We're using two different colours of brick and a composite wood –style cladding. We didn't want it to look like a brand new hotel just dropped into town. There will be a nice outdoor terrace area and an outdoor children's play area."

The restaurant and bar facilities will be open to locals and there will be plenty of parking for guests. A covered bike park for 12 cycles will also be provided.

Most people we spoke to seemed pleased with the plans, although some people were surprised that the location wasn't on the site of the old Northumberland Foods factory, while others wondered if odours from the nearby prawn factory or water works might cause problems.

Joan Vickers and her husband Terry thought a hotel for Amble was a good idea.


"I liked the look of the plans," said Joan. "It seemed to fit in with the surroundings."

"A hotel is long overdue, the way the town is going in the last few years," said Terry. "We've been here ten years and the place has changed so much for the better. The town's popularity has suddenly mushroomed and outstripped the facilities."

John Carruthers of Beddy Buys on Coquet Enterprise Park was also in favour of the plans. "It's something Amble needs. The plans looked OK and in keeping with the area, although it wasn't where I thought it was going to be."

Amble WW2 veteran honoured with top Russian medal

Amble WW2 veteran Richard Aston, who took part in a vital supply convoy in treacherous conditions, has been awarded a prestigious medal by the Russian Consul General.

General Andrey Pritsepov talked to Richard, before presenting the 92 year old Navy veteran with the Ushakov medal, Russia's highest naval award.

During WW2, Richard (known to his friends as Dick,) was a telegraphist on HMS Trumpeter, and took part in one of the Arctic convoys, when British and American naval ships helped deliver much needed supplies to Russia.

Between 1941 and 1945, the Royal Navy escorted hundreds of merchant ships, often in the harshest conditions, and many were sunk by German U-boat attacks.

"Churchill described it as a 'hellish job" said Richard. "We went with food, ammunition and fuel, and the Germans were doing everything they could to stop us.

"I remember the bitter cold, minus 34 degrees sometimes, with rough seas. It took us three weeks, our convoy leaving from the Orkney Islands to Murmansk.

"Yes, I was nervous, but it was part of the job. The seas were rough, but you hope for the best. I couldn't swim – actually many of the crew couldn't swim, but the sea was so cold, if you got in, you only had a three minute survival rate – so it wouldn't have mattered if you could swim or not!"

Richard described how honoured he felt when receiving the medal. He and his four daughters travelled to Edinburgh for the ceremony on 30 August, expecting to receive his medal with other Arctic convoy veterans, but his was a one-to-one meeting.

"I met the Russian Consul, General Pritsepov, who talked with me for about an hour, then he stood and shook my hand. He pinned the medal on me and presented me with a watch in a presentation case signed by Vladimir Putin. Then he said 'See you tonight for the reception."

The reception to mark 75 years since the convoys, was a lavish affair, held on the Royal Yacht Britannia, with 250 guests, bands, pipers, champagne, speeches and cameras everywhere.

Forty veterans were presented with gift bags containing a specially distilled whisky, a tartan rug created for the occasion, a hip flask and a book containing interviews of other Arctic convoy veterans.

Richard joined the Navy in 1942 aged 18 and became a wireless operator. His part in the convoy began on 12 March 1945. "It was my 21st birthday on the 14th, so I had to wait till I came back for my cards!"

After the war, Richard returned to Amble and resumed his career in the Post Office. He married Doreen in 1948 and they had four daughters. Doreen died in 1990. Richard has six grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

"The Consul was absolutely lovely. He shook hands and looked straight into our eyes," said Richard's daughter Eleanor Cromarty.

"He said there was not one family in Russia that hadn't been affected by deprivation. He said the Russians were hugely grateful for the Arctic convoys."

Some "fantastic individual results" in GCSEs and A levels have been achieved by pupils at JCSC. Scores indicate that students at GCSE level have progressed better than the national average since the end of the Primary phase.

Results from the 2016 A level cohort, show not only 100% pass rate, but 64% of students achieved one or more, A*, A or equivalent. 46% of students are moving on to university, many of them going to Russel Group Universities.

A spokesman for the school told us: "The start of the new academic year brings some exciting and positive changes to JCSC.

"A new Leadership Team, led by the new Executive Headteacher, Neil Rodgers, sees a renewed focus on improved teaching and learning to support our students to achieve their maximum potential. "As we are fortunate in being a relatively small school, members of our professional and dedicated staff team are able to get to personally know and teach our students as individuals, and as such, work tirelessly to achieve our aim of making sure all of our students have individual results that are reflective of achieving their individual goals, however high these may be.

"Although we are a federation of schools, our one school approach provides a seamless transition for our children from our pre-school Nursery through to Sixth Form".

Torchlight Procession gets funding boost

The town has been successful in gaining funding for this year's Torchlight Procession. £5,000 has been secured from the Big Lottery's Celebrate Your Community Fund, via a grant bid put in by Amble Events Committee, whose members include Amble Development Trust, Amble Town Councillors, and members of the business community.

"We'll be using that money to pay for lantern making workshops in the First Schools and Brambles' Nursery," said Julia Aston, director of Amble Development Trust. "And there will be community lantern making workshops held at the Seafood Centre."

This year's lantern theme will be Alice In Wonderland. Funding has meant that at the event there will also be a stilt walker and a fire dancer. Santa has promised to join in the fun, and will be in the Seafood Centre from 4pm. Children from Brambles will decorate the Christmas tree in the High Street garden at 4.30pm. The procession will leave the

Wellwood at 5pm and parade down Queen Street to the Town Square.

"We would particularly ask anyone thinking of arriving in a large vehicle/tractor/ etc to please let us know beforehand, so we can assign them a safe place in the parade," said Julia.

Druridge Bay opencast plans halted by government

The decision made by Northumberland County Council to allow an opencast site to go ahead on Druridge Bay, has suffered a delay, with the government stepping in at the last minute.

The plans by Banks Mining, would see the creation of a surface mine on farmland at Highthorn, Druridge Bay, on a 250 hectare site between Widdrington Village and Cresswell.

Banks were planning to extract up to three million tonnes of coal over a five year period, starting in 2017, and had vowed to restore the land by the end of seven years. The project was claimed to ensure the retention of 50 jobs in the company, with a further 50 created as a result.

The plans were initially granted approval from Northumberland County Council, despite protests from environmental campaigners.

Berwick MP Anne-Marie Trevelyan told The Ambler that she had asked the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government Sajid Javid, to 'call in' the proposal, meaning that his department will consider the plans themselves.

She said that government policy is to phase out coal power stations by 2025, therefore she believed that the whole project

is against government policy.

Anne-Marie explained that Sajid Javid will talk with his team of planning experts, before making a decision. It is on hold now and will be determined later. It is not certain how long the decision will take.

The government's decision was criticised by Northumberland County Council.

A spokesman said it was "surprised and disappointed" - because the scheme had won unanimous cross-party approval at the planning stage.

The spokesman added: "We always recognised that the application would be controversial and so were determined to involve a wide range of views. In the end all members felt that a clear case had been made for the economic benefits both locally and to the wider Northumberland area.

"At least 100 jobs that would have been created through the substantial investment offered by a firm with a track record of providing growth in the region have now been put in doubt by the Secretary of State's surprising decision.

"Measures to minimise any environmental impact of the mining were a key part of the business case and lengthy community discussions ensured residents were fully involved. So this snatching away

of local decision-making by local people for local benefit is very disappointing.

"The council is ready to play its full part in making the case for the much-needed extra employment and other benefits at the inquiry."

Mrs Trevelyan said "I have been been involved in the discussions with Banks Mining since the beginning, and have found them very accommodating. They have shown consideration around other sites. There has been much pressure, however, from local residents, to stop the plans and I believe it will not be good for the environment."

Can you help Amble Youth Project?

Can you help? Amble Youth Project is a registered charity (1139889) which began in 1996 as part of a crime prevention initiative to help tackle the high level of youth involvement in crime and disorder in the area.

Since then, Amble Youth Project has helped address many issues and problems facing local young people and, in conjunction with Coquet Churches Together, has run a Friday night session from October to March each year offering 13–19 year olds somewhere to go during the dark winter nights, rather than being vulnerable to engaging in risky anti-social behaviour.

Friday night sessions offer a safe, welcoming place to be, providing activities, snacks and warm drinks along with advice, information and guidance.

Over the last four years this session has become very popular with up to 28 young people attending. There is, however, no ongoing funding for the project.

We need to pay for one qualified youth worker, the minimum requirement for each session, plus refreshments and contributions for the cost of running the building.

The qualified youth worker is supported entirely by volunteers so there are no additional staff costs. Each session, therefore, costs only £45, a total of £900 for this year's run of 20 weeks from October 2016-March 2017.

We will be discussing how to raise funds for 2017-18 and beyond with our young people, but need to be sure we can go ahead this year first.

It would be a most welcome gesture if a number of our local individuals/small businesses/organisations and other charities could consider investing small one-off amounts of say £20 each in our local young people and their future through this project, in other words to enable us to provide 'lots for little'. Adult learning returns to Amble

Adults and young people are now once again able to access a variety of local learning programmes.

Northumberland County Council has converted the Amble Cash Office, in Fourways 1, into a learning suite, where courses in English, maths and IT will be made available, along with Job Clubs and employability programmes.

The county council previously used the Dovecote Centre to provide learning and training, and after it closed, there was a search for accommodation in Amble for courses. However, that problem has been solved, hopefully to the satisfaction of those who were upset at lack of classes.

Michael Holliday, of the Learning and Skills Service, reports: "There'll also be opportunities to train in childcare and for careers that support teachers in the classroom. A flexible approach to delivery means that courses can be tailor made. Whether it's digital photography, food hygiene, First Aid, or crafts for Christmas, the hope is that local people and businesses will take full advantage of the provision".

Classes will start in the week beginning Monday 10 October.

North-east devolution: "full steam ahead"

More jobs, more money and more local decisionmaking are all heading to the North-east after a Minister's clear backing for regional devolution.

Councillor Grant Davey, leader of Northumberland County Council, has said clear support for regional devolution by Sajid Javid, Secretary of State for Local Government, means it is 'full steam ahead'.

Local authority chiefs from the North-east met Mr Javid in London and he was said to be 'very clear' that the Government is committed to devolution, with an elected mayor an essential part of the package.

"The time for talking about devolution is over - it is time

for us all to roll up our sleeves and make this great county even better, with the many benefits that increased local decisionmaking will bring," said Councillor Davey.

He added that a stronger Northumberland is central to economic success north of the Tyne - and the whole NE has a vital role to play.

Checks to prevent misuse of the bus pass

New checks have been introduced on buses to prevent the misuse of concessionary bus passes meant

for older and disabled people. Smart ticket machines have been programmed to indicate whether a concessionary bus pass has been cancelled.

Following an initial amnesty period, payment may be required

and free travel refused where a pass is not valid, and the pass may be confiscated by the driver

More than a million journeys are made every week by passengers with concessionary bus passes, costing local transport authorities tens of millions each year in payments to bus companies.

The new checks will reduce potential misuse and fraud while protecting passengers who are entitled to and benefit from concessionary travel.

Councillor Allan Hepple, Cabinet Member for Economic Growth with Northumberland County Council, said: "Smart ticketing means we have the technology to make sure concessionary travel is enjoyed by those people it is intended for, without the potential for misuse or fraud.

"For the vast majority of people this will make no difference at all. There will be publicity on buses with advice on checking if using the right pass, and local councils are ready to answer any questions."

It is estimated that about one in 40 passes in the North East is in use, despite being cancelled.

Wristband awareness to combat underage drinking

The Alnwick and Amble Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP) continues to make great progress working with young people and different partners to address under age drinking. The partnership includes Police, Northumberland County Council, schools, health services and local retailers, among many others, all of whom have come together to pool their resources under the CAP umbrella to ensure that there is a joint partnership approach.

Although most young people in the area do not drink alcohol at all, the partnership was set up to ensure that support is given to those groups working with young people, the community and young people themselves so that they are educated around the risks relating to alcohol consumption. This relates not just to health risks, but other issues such as drink driving and risk taking behaviour.

Several initiatives have been set up recently. One of these involved young people from the area being asked to design a wrist band to raise awareness and, after a very difficult time judging the many excellent entries, two winners were announced. Their winning logos were made into a wrist band which will be given free to all young people in the area. Sainsbury's also awarded the winners a £1 itunes voucher each.

Other planned activities include a weekend of action around proxy alcohol sales - buying for under 18s: retailers and licensees are currently being offered free training to support their good practice when it comes to alcohol sales and young people.

Captain Coquet's

Coquet's Rosys do it again!



As the season draws to a close, the RSPB wardens have been turning to the report writing and all the behind-the-scene jobs that get done when the birds have left.

It's been a long season for the bird assemblage – mainly due to those terrible bad weather weeks in spring and early summer. Many of the tern nests failed with eggs chilled in the rain and wind.

The improved weather later in the summer gave them a second chance and relays were everywhere, even on the paths and spilling onto the roseate tern terraces. As for the roseates, numbers held, and for the second year in a row their nests topped

three figures. The new hide was installed at the start of the season and offered shelter for the "night watchers" that guarded the roseates each night.

The hide was purposebuilt by local blacksmith artist, Stephen Lunn and funded by the European LIFE project that has been set up to safeguard Coquet's roseate terns for the next five years. The same project funded the live-link from cameras on the island which gave thousands of people world wide the chance to observe the antics of the roseates and puffins without any disturbance. The link will be up and running next

year, so don't forget to check it out!

The eiders braved it out and ended up with 329 nests which produced a small flotilla of eider duckling crèches in the harbour. Many of these birds grew into adulthood, but quite a few succumbed to large gulls. The puffins were undaunted by the season's bad weather - their pufflings were safely tucked away in their burrows and the good supply of sandeels this year helped to keep the overall bird population well supplied with food.

We were still seeing sandwich terns roosting at the end of September, as the wintering population of bird species were arriving: robins, curlew, twite and purple sandpiper.

A welcome sight has been the arrival of the Trinity House painting team – giving the lighthouse a fresh coat or two of special paint.

Three weeks of hard graft, helped with some fabulous September sunshine and the lighthouse looks like new!

A good Coquet season!



Becky calls for change in benefits to young people diagnosed with cancer

An ex James Calvert Spence College student has joined other young people calling on the government to change the way benefits payments are handled when young people are diagnosed with cancer.

Becky Cole, who now lives in Longframlington, was 20 years old when she was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma at Christmas in 2014. The diagnosis left her not only with fears for her future, but also financial worries, as she had to give up her job and begin applying for sickness benefits.

Becky was asked by cancer charity Clic Sargent, to take part in an event in the Houses of Parliament, to highlight the financial impact on young people diagnosed with cancer. The event was hosted by Labour MP Thangam Debbionare.

Becky said: "I explained how my partner and I were working full time and had just moved into our own house. Shortly after, I was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma, and my partner and I had to give up work and apply for sickness benefits."

"The main problem was the amount of money families or individuals are paying out each month to cover the cost of cancer. You need an extra $\pounds 600$ on top of all normal bills to fund the cost of this. It includes food, clothes, transport, bills when not able to work and hospital parking.

"If it wasn't for a Clic Sargent support worker in the Freeman Hospital, I don't know what we would have done," she said. The charity is calling for a number of changes to help ease the financial burden on children, young people and their families after a cancer diagnosis. They want a review of travel assistance for parents and young people, financial support from the point of diagnosis, and a review by financial services and energy companies to ensure parents of children with cancer and young cancer patients are included on their vulnerable customer policies.

Clic Sargent Chief
Executive Kate Lee said: "The parliamentary event was a wonderful opportunity to share our Cancer Costs research with a range of people who can help us achieve the aims of our campaign. It is not right or fair that so many children, young

right or fair that so many children, young people and parents find themselves financially worse off following a cancer diagnosis and we are urging as many people as possible to join our campaign. I'd like to thank everyone who attended the event, particularly those who spoke about their own experiences of childhood cancer."

After her cancer diagnosis, Becky underwent six rounds of intense chemotherapy over six months and received

the all clear in August 2015. She told The Ambler how pleased she had been to be able to take part in the parliamentary event: "My voice was heard not only for myself, but for many other young people suffering the same experience. I will also be contacting my local MP, Anne- Marie Trevelyan, to gain support and awareness for the cause.

Becky said "It has been a once in a life time experience and I was thrilled to participate".



A word of warning. Take your time on bits of the path through the woods that are uneven, muddy or have a slope. Walking poles might be useful. Better still, do this walk in dry weather.


It took me 1 hr. 15mins in each direction. Of course on the way back to Morpeth you know where you're going.





Scam callers switch tactics

Priminals trying to defraud Northumberland residents by phone have begun concocting new false stories, county trading standards chiefs have warned.

Victims of attempted scams report strangers pretend to be HMRC officials threatening to take them to court for so-called 'unpaid tax' - while other con-artists claim they are council staff offering help with 'compensation' after imaginary accidents. Neither is a genuine call and householders should hang up, without giving personal or financial details.

David Sayer, county council business compliance and public safety manager, said: "We are receiving up to six complaints daily. If you are worried about any official sounding call you receive, hang up and contact the Citizens Advice Consumer Service." Help can be given by the CA team on 0345 404 0506.

To confirm if a call from the council is genuine, residents should ask for the person's council extension then check it out by ringing back via the main county switchboard on 0345





REPORTS FROM OUR

Top of my complaints list at the moment are issues about grounds maintenance, roads and footpaths. I hoped that the appointment of a seasonal worker in partnership with Amble Town Council would mean a significant improvement in our area. A new worker is in place but recruitment issues meant a big gap in manpower. And it showed.

I am keen to see Town and Parish Councils working with the County to make scarce resources go further. The basic standards need to be right. I have raised issues about using staff more effectively especially now that the housing service has come back to NCC.

I have had lots of complaints about the state of the Radcliffe Road and Hauxley road ends. There may be issues of subsidence caused by former mine workings. The County Council is in discussions with the Coal Authority (they have responsibility for problems which are the legacy of the National Coal Board.)

I have stressed how concerned I am about the state of these roads in particular and how important it is to keep local councils and the community informed about what the problems are and plans to find solutions.

I have made it clear that I am angry at the state some our estates have been left in. Senior managers accept that this needs to change and I will do whatever I can to raise and maintain standards.

There is some excellent work being done to make Amble a better town. Volunteers, local councils and community groups are improving things. I am supporting the efforts of local councillors to safeguard against a repeat of the serious flooding which hit Hauxley last winter.

It is obvious that the Government's plans to reduce revenue support for Northumberland County Council by 84% between 2010 and 2020 (and shift the burden to Council Tax payers and businesses) is having and will have a serious impact on all local services. Unless there is a change of strategy by Government the challenges Northumberland will face can only increase.
