Acharity which supports wounded servicemen and women will be visiting Amble as part of their 'Walk of Britain'

Walking with the Wounded raises funds for the re-education and re-training of wounded servicemen and women. Their patron, Prince Harry has accompanied them on previous challenges, which have included expeditions to the North Pole in 2011, Everest in 2012 and the South Pole in 2013.

Prince Harry described the Walk of Britain: "This 1000 mile challenge is to prove the extraordinary determination of our wounded, and connect the great British public with the extraordinary actions of extraordinary people."



The group will arrive in Amble Town Square on the afternoon of Tues 1 September. After a meal courtesy of the Old Boat House, and an overnight stay at the Sun Hotel in Warkworth, the walkers will resume their challenge the following morning.

"We will depart from the Town Square sometime after breakfast, we're hoping to walk past Brambles Childcare even if it's just a wave from the kids there and continue south on our way," said team member Matt Fisher.

"Thank you so much to all of you for your support with this, we are all very much looking forward to meeting as many of you as possible in Amble!"

National cycle race puts Amble on map



ur town is about to be put on the cycling map when the Tour de Britain passes through on September 9.

Route plans for the prestigious Aviva Tour of Britain cycle race include two exciting Northumberland stages.

The cyclists will pass Amble during Stage Four of the tour. That leg of the race starts in Scotland, then enters Northumberland heading along

a route from Ford. It then heads to Wooler and Alnwick, before continuing down the coast, through Amble, finishing in Blyth.

The route past Amble will be the same route as that taken by the Olympic torch: from Warkworth, up the Wynd, along Albert Street and towards Radcliffe. (See map).

Road closures will affect the town between 13.25 and 14.55.

The tour re-starts the following morning from Prudhoe with Stage Five, from Haydon Bridge to Hadrian's Wall. The race will then head across the Pennines into Cumbria before ending in a summit finish on Hartside Fell.

The whole eight-stage race runs from 6-13 September.

Northumberland County Council has worked with Active Northumberland, sponsors Northumbrian Water and race organisers SweetSpot to bring the race to Northumberland.

Last year the UK's favourites Sir Bradley Wiggins and Mark Cavendish were both in the 120-rider starting line-up.

The tour will feature the biggest line-up of UCI WorldTeams to race in the UK this year.



Headlining the 20-team list are Team Cannondale Garmin, who won the 2014 Tour of Britain with Dylan Van Baarle and the Etixx Quick-Step team of Mark Cavendish and World Champion Michal Kwiatkowski. Top level British interests are represented by Team Sky. Some teams have been in action in the Tour de France.

David Hall, of Northumbrian Water said: "As the Tour of Britain passes through what we consider one of the best cycling counties in the UK, it will help to boost regional tourism and showcase Northumberland to the rest of the world."




The Tour will be broadcast in over 166 countries, including live coverage on the ITV network, and will raise the profile of the county to an international audience.

The race will go through 29 communities in Northumberland, covering approximately 112miles (181kms) over two days of racing.

As milk prices fall, Zombies rise

Farming has never been for the faint-hearted, but these days it's tougher than ever. And one enterprising farmer from Hauxley has now enlisted the help of the undead in order to resurrect his business.

Supermarkets demand more from farmers and offer less in return. They offer cut prices to us the consumers, but in order to keep their profits stable, they reduce the amount they pay their suppliers. It's enough to curdle the milk.

Alan Conway runs a small dairy farm in High Hauxley with his father Peter. "Last year we would get between 33 and 34p per litre for our milk," he told The Ambler. "This year it's 19.5p per litre, which leaves a bit of a

shortfall to say the least."

So how does a farmer stave off the prospect of the death of his family business? Well in this instance, the Conway family have rounded up a group of Zombies to help out.

"We were looking at diversification and we hope we might have come up with a fun way of doing it," said Alan. "We were looking at 'tough nutter' events with extreme obstacles and we decided to put on a Zombie run."

Save us from a Zombie apocalypse

The challenge is for runners to complete a 5k course with obstacles, without being attacked by Zombies. Runners wear a velcro belt with three ribbons, which the Zombies will try to grab. Contestants try to complete the course without losing any ribbons.

The Running of the Zombies event will take place at Hauxley Farm on Saturday September 5th.

"There will be round bale obstacles, crawl nets, wooden walls and of course a water hazard to make everyone wet!" said Alan.

So far there has been a good deal of interest, particularly with local Zombies,

but Alan hopes adults and children will also seize the opportunity to help avoid a Zombie apocalypse in Northumberland.

"Adults have a 5k course, but there's a smaller 1.5k course for children over five (who must be accompanied by an adult). Bigger kids can go around the whole course if they want," said Alan.

Prices are £30 for adults and £15 for children. There's free infield

car parking and all participants will get a t-shirt and a medal.

Milk vending machine

The enterprising Conway family are also looking at other means of diversification on their 200 acre dairy farm.

They have 130 cows and a new robotic milking system, which replaced their traditional milking machines. As a result, Alan and his father now offer courses to other farmers on the basics of robotic milking and use of the computer equipment.

"We're looking at different ways, trying to make a bit of money. We might even be looking at putting a milk vending machine at the bottom of the drive," said Alan.

Giant 'ipods' want your thoughts

Giant ipod-like devices have been installed in parts of Amble and the public are being asked to interact with them.

Newcastle University PhD student Ian Johnson has chosen Amble for a trial run of a new gadget, which collects public opinion about a geographical area. The information can then be used in local decision-making.

Ian is finishing his first year at Newcastle University's Open Lab, where he is studying Digital Civics. His research project is part of the Local Democracy programme.

"I've created an interactive map, where people can respond to questions about how they feel about different places and spaces in their community," said Ian.

The 'Viewpoint Devices', as they are called, use a heat map, and by touching the screen, information is collected and people can also see what others have selected.

The questions appear at the top of the screen, and a map of Amble appears below. For example one question is: What part of Amble would you most like to change? To answer, you press the relevant area on the

"Hopefully I'll get some interesting data that might show shared concern for a particular part of the town," said Ian.

"People may have pre-conceptions about different parts of the town. Because you can see what others have answered, that might challenge or confirm what people think."

Four devices have been placed around Amble: at Amble Development Trust, at the Harbour, in Amble Library and a roaming device situated in various cafes and pubs.

Ian's wider ambition is that the device creates data that people can use to get their concerns across to decision makers. "You can use it to collect data, like with a petition. You can say 'look, this is not just my concern, here's the data to prove

other people feel the same'," explained Ian.

Ian hopes people in Amble will interact with the devices, which will be trialled throughout August. Once the trial is over, he is happy to share data.

HMP Northumberland volunteer highly commended

Along-serving volunteer at HMP Northumberland has been commended by the North East Prison After Care Society (Nepacs). Christine Waters from Amble, was one of twelve volunteers who received a certificate of high commendation. Christine was recognised for her work as a Nepacs volunteer over many years at HMP Northumberland Visitors' Centre.

At an awards ceremony held at Lumley Castle, Chester -Le-Street, Probation/ Community Rehabilitation Companies (CRCs), prison officers and others who work with offenders in the North East, were presented with awards for their efforts to support rehabilitation and reduce reoffending.

Volunteers needed

Nepacs owns two caravans on the Northumberland coast (near Amble) and offers weekly holidays to families of prisoners. The aim is to give families a chance to relax in pleasant surroundings and spend valuable time together.

Kath Ogilvie, Nepacs trustee and coordinator of the caravan project, said: "Every year thousands of children and families experience the impact of imprisonment despite many never having being involved in or committed a crime.

From the moment of arrest, throughout the court process and prison sentence, families are at risk of social isolation and stigma which can affect their emotional, physical, financial and social wellbeing.

"We have operated the caravan project for many years and it really makes a difference to the families to have a holiday. Some have never experienced a holiday before and it gives them a well needed break."

Nepacs is looking for volunteers to help clean out the caravans and make them presentable for the next holiday makers each week, then welcome the families and introduce them to the site.

You will not be working alone, but with our experienced project leader. The project needs volunteers for a few hours every Wednesday 10.30am – 2.30pm approximately.

An ex JCSC student has made the trip of a lifetime on board a Tall Ships yacht as an ambassador for the North Sea Tall Ships Regatta – Blyth 2016.

Emily Runciman aged 17, answered an advert for a bursary giving a young person a chance to join the crew of the Black Diamond of Durham as a volunteer sailing to the Tall Ships Belfast 2015 event.

The bursary, sponsored by Active Northumberland and the Port of Blyth, provided a 14-day taste of maritime adventure. Emily spent 10 days at sea on board the Class 'C' Tall Ship yacht, sailing from Hartlepool to Belfast via the Caledonian Canal and Loch Ness.

Emily, who grew up in Amble told The Ambler: "I had never sailed before so it was a jump in at the deep end for me, but I took the chance.

"Within the trip I've done practically everything there is to do on the yacht: helm, map navigation, cooking, being on watch during overnight sails, taking the sail up and down. There are so many things to do which kept me busy! The ship arrived in Belfast on 1 July, where the trainees enjoyed the fun, excitement, entertainment and activities of the Crew Parade, Crew Prize-giving and Crew Party before departing on 5 July.

Emily said: "The race from Belfast to Alesund was so nerve wracking. It took a lot of caffeine to get us there but it was worth it in the end. We came 4th in our category, which I think was great considering we were racing against loads of racing yachts which the Black Diamond isn't.

Emily said: "I have had a brilliant time on board the Black Diamond. It can be challenging at times but it's very rewarding in the end and has given me a real sense of achievement.

"I would highly recommend taking part in the Tall Ships training programme to anyone as it is an unforgettable experience. It encourages you to get involved in something new, and you learn new skills and how to work as part of a crew.

Bruce Ledger from Active Northumberland/Northumberland Sport said: "Emily is a fantastic ambassador for the county

"Boarding the boat to leave for Belfast... It all hit me that I'm going away from home doing something madly out of my experience and comfort zone. The first few days weren't too bad as we were learning the ropes. Then we had to do a night sail which was awful. Four hours on and four hours off had to be the most exhausting thing ever. I just couldn't wait to get to Belfast as I was so tired!

"However as we went through the Caledonian Canal, we couldn't sail at night which meant we could have a bit of fun...at the pub!"

My intention was to write a short article with themes like Magna Carta (read by me for the first time) democracy (what does it really mean?), improvements seen in our time, hopes for the future, and, of course, our need to work together.

In a very short time our minds have turned to terrorist atrocities, Greek debt and living conditions, and the effects of recent Budget announcements.

So many people live in fear, especially the fear of poverty. I've talked to people of all ages, and I've found that lots of them fear for their own futures, or the futures of their families and friends.

Management of change is the modern mantra. Rapid change makes all feel uncomfortable and insecure.

Apparently I'm not alone in fearing the break-up of the services we've come to rely on over the last 70 years or so.

Change creeps up on us in the most unexpected ways. Perhaps we've become complacent, accepting our low level of productivity and the apathy that seems to be widespread nowadays.

I suppose that I've been an unreconstructed liberal (of no political allegiance) all of my adult life. Perhaps I became one at the age of 12 when the Green Shoots of improvement began. Now, 70 years later, I can see everybody's point of view. I'm better off than I've ever been, in so many ways.

But when I look at the lives of my grandchildren, and of young people in poor health, I'm not so sure!

I know that a lot of people need a bit of a push to turn their lives round, but I also know that a lot of them need help, and so do their children. Society is all of us, and we all have to try to make it work.

A recent article in the "i" the other day reminded us all that "American levels of taxation and European levels of Services are incompatible.

As I've said many times, I like the changes in our town. I've heard very many positive comments by visitors, not least from members of groups that I took for history walks.

My hope is that people will be just as enthusiastic when they talk about Amble in another 70 years!!


Mermaids and pirates wanted at Lifeboat Day



The 2015 season on Coquet Island has seen fabulous numbers of puffins, eiders and terns supported by plentiful supplies of sandeels and other small fish being brought in for hungry chicks.

However, the overall success of the breeding season has been tempered by the grim weather, with a combination of strong winds and heavy rain.

Many of the tern chicks have perished but the parents have been responding by laying second clutches.

This means a late season for the birds, before they can set off on their globetrotting flights for the winter.

The roseate terns have been stars this year – for the first time since the island became an RSPB reserve, the number of nesting roseate terns have topped the 100 pairs, all using the special nesting boxes provide by the

The club continues to underpin its aim of being a destination club for people who want to enjoy themselves and book functions for wedding receptions, choirs, retirement parties, etc.



Chris Mullin, President of Northumberland Wildlife Trust, and Mike Pratt, Chief Exec of Northumberland Wildlife Trust placed the first straw bale, part of the eco-friendly walls at Hauxley Nature Reserve's new Wildlife Discovery visitor centre.

The new eco building was designed by architect Henry Amos of Brightblue Studio in North Shields and utilises environmentally sustainable construction methods and materials.

Stone gabions and straw bales will form part of the walls, while large wooden framed windows will afford breathtaking views over the Hauxley ponds and offer uninterrupted views of the abundant bird and wildlife.

Chris Mullin, author, journalist and former MP for Sunderland South (1987 – 2010) is also Chair of the Heritage Lottery Fund's North East Committee. He and Mike Pratt lifted the first straw bale and placed it on hand crafted wooden stakes, fastened into the building's foundations. The innovative modern building replaces the main hide and office which was devastated by arson in 2010.

Northumberland Wildlife Trust intend the new visitor centre to host an exciting programme of recreational, educational and volunteering activities designed to re-connect people with nature and the wider landscape.

- 1. Walk past Amble West Cemetery on the track that heads West to New Hall Farm.
- 2. Turn right along the road for about 30yards, then left through the gate.
- 3. Follow the track through a field and a gate, down a grassy track, then up a Stony track, crossing the road that leads to New Barns farm.
- 4. Continue on the farmer's road (newly gravelled) until vou reach Morwick Road.
- 5. Turn right along Morwick Road PAST the entrance to Morwick Ice Cream Parlour.
- 6. A couple of hundred yards further on you'll see the well -surfaced road that leads to the entrance to Morwick Hall. At the gateposts to the Hall follow the grass to left of the gates until you reach the road to Old Morwick.
- 7. Turn left past the cottages at Old Morwick, down the hill until you see a wooden Fingerpost on the right saying "Warkworth 1/4 via fords"! Don't worry, this is NOT A WET FEET JOB.
- 8. Now it's time to do a bit of fossicking about. Walk down to a lovely bit of our River Coquet.

Have a good look at everything in sight, including Jack's Rock (from a distance).

When you've seen all that you want to see, it's time to get back home. I usually go back the way I came! Another octogenarian and I did this walk in just over two hours.

allery 45 is situated in Felton and Jis housed inside the former Stag's Head pub. In days gone by, it was a Victorian pub on the village main street. It had been a thriving place over the years but changed hands several times and had been for sale for well over a year.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

IT WILL SOON BE TIME for the public consultation about the temporary one way system operating at the bottom of Queen Street, through Leazes Street, Lawson Street and George Street. At present this is an experimental order to try and alleviate traffic congestion, aid traffic movement and perhaps help, in a very small way, to alleviate some parking issues.

There were lots of 'teething problems' which NCC have tried hard to ease but it must be remembered that some issues have arisen because there can be no measures taken to make it seem as though this is permanent until after the experimental period and consultation are concluded and a definite decision taken- hence the likes of the temporary barriers at the Newburgh St end of Leazes St. This consultation will be open to the whole town so please take time to respond whatever your opinion may be.

Another aspect of traffic management is parking which has been a problem for the town for many years. The central part of Amble was built up a long time before motor transport became so popular and subsequently it is proving extremely difficult to find a long term solution for parking. There are very few spaces within the main area of the town or even derelict buildings to demolish to create space.

A temporary area has been reopened behind Tesco's store in a joint initiative between NCC, your NCC Councillors and the Town Council to try and help whilst other avenues are being investigated by the group tasked with this thorny problem.

PADDLERS NEW NAME

51 PEOPLE VOTED for their choice from four names and the winner was Paddlers Park by 45 votes.

It is hoped the name will be incorporated in a welcome sign being produced by H.M.P. Northumberland as part of a community partnership.

This will be placed at the Gordon Villas' entrance near a floral display set in a truck symbolising those used to carry stone from the quarry which was originally at this site. The anticipated completion date is the end of August and provided that happens, there will be an opening event on Saturday 29th from 2pm- 4.30pm

This will be a family occasion for all to see and use the new features and participate in some family fun, activities, games and refreshments.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASPECTS

WITH THE TYPICAL British changeable weather, grass seems to be growing at alarming rates and so the season has extended beyond April and September.

This means even longer grass to cut when the cutting season begins and so it seems to take 3-4 cuts to distribute the extra grass and have everywhere looking better.

Council have agreed to pay NCC for extra grass cuts along the main routes into the town so that they will not become so unattractive over the winter and early Spring.

When the public realms work began at the end of Lawson Street, the Coal Planter floral display was temporarily removed and Warkworth Harbour Commissioners (WHC) kindly allowed it to be placed on their land at the top of Broomhill Street back lane.

Now the work is completed, it was felt that the area did not lend itself to the reinstatement of the coal truck and so Council have gifted it to WHC who will leave it in place and take responsibility for it in the future.

Council have accepted the donation from Pride in Amble of another truck made by H.M.P. Northumberland; this will be placed at the entrance, at Gordon Villas, to the revitalised play area.

Council are currently in talks with Sodexo about H.M.P. Northumberland raising plants in their facility for our floral displays.

This initiative should mean that plug plants can be bought thus reducing costs per plant and increasing the amount purchased so displays can be bigger and better in the future.

A MBLE ON A OUT OF THE PARTY OF

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

RECENTLY ARRIVA have suggested that in the future they may change the route of the X20 to incorporate Percy Drive- however without showing a plan. Whilst welcoming this in principle, we need clarification of the possible new route as we are unsure what other parts of the town could be affected by any change.

When Council had meetings with NCC officers and Arriva officials some time ago- when it was first proposed to delete the 'Links Estate' from the X20 route- we did ask for future consideration to be given to this rerouting.

We suggested the bus turning at the Mason's Arms to go along Albert Street and down Percy Drive to Church Street as we felt the number of residences in this area would make it a more economically viable prospect.

However this may not be what they are considering so we have asked for clarification.

They are also suggesting that Alnmouth Station is added to the X20 instead of the X18 so that it is easier for people from this area to connect with the trains.

PLANNING CONSULTATIONS

COUNCIL HAVE RECENTLY been involved in Planning consultations on 3 draft documents designed to help Councillors approaching planning applications under the new NCC decision structure. They concerned major developments, pre-planning protocols and S106 agreements- 'planning gains'. It is hoped that these will result in greater participation between developers, NCC officers and your community; those coming forward with large applications for housing or commercial developments are to be encouraged to approach Councils, and sometimes the community, for comments before a full application is made.

An example of this was the new housing development at Dandsfield Square which resulted in some changes being made, such as to the layout, before the final plans were drawn up. In this way, NCC hope the full application process will be quicker without impacting on the community's right to comment.

There will also be greater consultation with towns and villages in any planning gain attached to developments so that they more accurately reflect community needs.

NASTRO: what is a lunar eclipse?

Nastro. During the autumn, with darker evenings returning, the club is planning a number of events for beginners.

Some of them will be tied into notable astronomical events such as the lunar eclipse in September (more about that in a moment) whilst other sessions will deal with practical astronomy – choosing and using telescopes.

Back to that lunar eclipse! Total lunar eclipses occur when the full moon passes completely into the shadow of the Earth. The full moon darkens to a deep orange or red because not all the sunlight is blocked: some passes through our atmosphere and is reddened and scattered onto the moon. This lunar eclipse will be visible from Northumberland in the early hours of September 28th. The shadow will appear to cross the moon around 2am and the moon will be totally eclipsed from 3.10am until 4.23am.

Amble yachts storm to victory

he inaugural Northumberland Yachting Plate saw Amble yachts take first and third position in a fast and furious race from the harbour mouth down to Blyth. This result gave the winning boat and club trophy to Coquet Yacht Club.

Winning yacht was Medmerry II, skippered by Allen Brunton, who described the event for The Ambler:

"Medmerry II was one of the group of four big yachts, and last round Coquet Island. We were so busy fixing an extra reef in the mainsail that we did not notice the start and so were very much last of the eleven boats to start.

"By the North East Coquet buoy we passed all the smaller boats, and had a tremendous effort to chase down the other three big boats.

"Medmerry II is well suited to strong weather, and we were gaining very slowly on the others and deep into Blyth Bay before we passed Peter Lowery in Schuuper and Nick Spurr in Spurreli only passing John Dixon in Monkey Business after rounding the offshore radio mast heading into Blyth.

"20 miles and about three hours of racing very closely boat to boat, some of the best sailing that you could find anywhere; a crew of 10 very happy people.

"It is a race for a mixed fleet of yachts, from 24 to 41 feet long. The prize is calculated by applying a 'handicap' correcting factor to the time that each boat takes to sail the course.

'On a day with plenty of wind (over 30 knots) the big boats will usually outperform the smaller ones; it is much tougher for them but they still have a chance on handicap.

"Medmerry II was first over the
