Wounded soldiers welcomed by youngsters




Brambles' nursery children had a busy start to their new term; one of their first activities was meeting the Walking with the Wounded team who are raising money for

Amble bistro forced to change its name

Getting noticed is not always a beneficial thing. We were sorry to learn that popular Amble bistro Sea Salt has had to change its name, after Cornish clothing company Seasalt objected. The clothing company said: "From the outset of our business, we have always tried to be distinctive and to this end we trademarked the name "Seasalt", not only for clothing, but also for restaurants and cafés."

Bistro co-owner Julie Lunn-Bird explained the change of name on their Facebook page: "We tried changing it to Sea-Salt Amble, Sea & Salt Amble and a few others but they 'own' the rights to so many variations of the words." She told The Ambler: "We are disappointed, but unfortunately we can't afford the legal fees to continue to fight them." So Julie and Jonny's restaurant will now be called Sea & Soil.

Residents parking consultation

Residents in George St and Lawson Street are being consulted by Northumberland County Council, on the possible implementation of a residents' parking scheme. Letters will be sent to all residents of the two streets at the beginning of October, outlining possible options.

Public toilets to close during winter

One of Amble's public toilets will close over the winter, following a review of all the county's conveniences.

Budget cuts have forced Northumberland County Council (NCC) to consider whether all their public toilets need to be kept open all year round.

The Council say they recognise the importance of public toilets although there is no legal requirement to provide them. And over the last year, NCC say they have invested £50,000 to refurbish public toilets.

The review looked at the 62 public toilets the County Council currently owns or operates across Northumberland. They are approaching parish and town councils to discuss their needs and how best they can be provided.

More local businesses and organisations with customer toilets have been approached about

joining NCC's 'You're welcome to use our loos' scheme, where local businesses are offered a £500 a year (£250 for winter) to make their toilets available to the public.

NCC believe the review is expected to result in £120,000 savings and, if approved, would recommend nine toilets being closed, with winter closures for some.

The council currently spends approx. £600,000 a year on public toilets, with a third of the cost relating to the opening, closing, cleaning and re-stocking of the toilets.

The average cost of running a toilet block a year, taking into account business rates, building maintenance and utility costs is between £8,000-£14,000.

The review recommends that the closures will take place from November. For a full list of the toilets due to close, see NCC's website.

Don't get inconvenienced: winter closures of public toilets

Amble

Tourist Information – no change.

Broomhill St - toilets to close during the winter. Toilets are available at the Tourist Information Centre and additional provision is being secured via the 'You're welcome to use our Loos' scheme.

Warkworth

Warkworth Beach – to close during the winter. Brewery Lane – to close during the winter. The council is progressing the 'You're welcome to use our Loos' schemes in the area.

Alnmouth

Marine Road – discussions with the Parish Council regarding funding /to maintain existing opening hours, otherwise the toilets will be closed during the winter.

Alnwick

The Shambles & Greenwell Rd - no change.

The Friendliest Port greets brave soldiers

Amble once again proved it is the Friendliest Port, as a large crowd gathered to welcome a group of disabled service personnel, as they stopped in the area overnight.

The group are walking 1000 miles from Scotland to Buckingham Palace in aid of the Walking With the Wounded charity.

The Friendliest Port provided the biggest greeting yet for the team of six walkers on their 72 day challenge.

The charity, whose patron is Prince Harry, raises money to help service men and women who have been wounded, to re-train for careers outside the military.

The Walk of Britain is the group's latest challenge to raise awareness and money for the charity. Previous years have seen challenges in the North Pole, Mount Everest, and the South Pole.

The team set off on August 22nd and are passing through 150 villages, towns and cities along the route to Buckingham Palace.

September 1 saw the team leave Eglingham after breakfast, stopping at Alnwick at lunchtime where they met the Duchess of Northumberland.





They arrived in Amble at just after 4pm, walking down Queen Street to the Town Square, where they were met by a crowd of around a hundred people who cheered and clapped. The group was escorted into the square by Northumbrian Piper Beverley Palin.

Once in the square, they were presented with a cheque from Amble Town Council for £100 and a book commemorating WW1. Amble Churches Together and other groups presented money and a gift of a photograph.

Team member Matt Fisher, told The Ambler: "It's great to be here! It's so nice to see Amble. I had been planning this stage of the route, so it's great to actually see it in the flesh. And it's so good to see such a big turnout from local people. I wasn't expecting

all the presentations. This is the biggest turnout so far" he said.

The six walkers have all suffered traumatic injuries while on duty. Individual incidents such as bomb blasts, a helicopter crash and gun shot wounds have all resulted in amputations or severe and on-going injuries. The team was made up of four British soldiers and two US Marines.

Generous local businesses offered the group icecream from Spurreli and an evening meal at the Old Boat House. Their overnight accommodation was provided by the Sun Hotel in Warkworth.

"Amble can be really proud of itself" said a spokesperson from Amble Town Council.

American Marine remembered in Amble

US Marine Kirstie Ennis is the only female Walking Walking wounded in 2012, while serving in Afghanistan.

At various stages of her walk, 24 year old Kirstie left ID (dog) tags belonging to fallen US servicemen. She placed one inside the clock tower; a fitting resting place as it is also Amble's war memorial.

She told The Ambler: "I'm carrying 25 dog tags with me on this walk. Some of the servicemen were killed in action, others fell to PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder). Every 40 miles along the walk, I place a dog tag along with a poem I wrote."

Kirstie herself was badly injured in a helicopter crash in Helmand Province, Afghanistan. She suffered severe facial, head and brain injuries, spinal injuries, hearing impairment and a devastating leg and foot injury. She has had 38 operations so far.

"Six of my crew died in the crash" she said.

"Ours was a memorial helicopter, painted in memory of Captain Daniel Bartle. His helicopter crashed six months before ours, in exactly the same place."

Kirstie says she is walking to honour and remember her friends and colleagues who didn't make it home. The dog tag she chose to leave in Amble belonged to Captain Bartle.

Amble entrepreneur joins Northern Powerhouse talks

The North is in desperate need of more effective business leadership says an Amble entrepreneur. At a recent Northern Powerhouse meeting, aerial photography engineer Nigel King met the Chancellor of the Exchequer, where the possibility of elected regional mayors was discussed.

Nigel was invited to the meeting together with around 60 other business representatives from the North. Nigel is the founder, owner and director of QuestUAV, an aerial photography and mapping company, which designs and manufactures unmanned aerial vehicles, known as drones.

"I met Anne-Marie Trevelyan a few months ago, before the election" he told The Ambler. "She was very interested in what we do, and our potential for technical development and apprenticeships. We were invited to 11 Downing Street to participate in the Northern Powerhouse meeting with the Chancellor of the Exchequer and other local MPs."

Items under discussion included the role and funding of Local Area Partnerships (LEPs) and the possibility of a regional mayor.

"We need someone with business acumen who would help people work together, especially in the areas of infrastructure and technology," said Nigel.

Nigel is passionate about the potential in the local area. "The North East is the only area of the UK with a positive export figure and is the major exporter in the UK.

We've got so much going for us. It's true a lot of it is down to Nissan, but we have some tremendous tech start-ups. And of course an especial interest to me is the unmanned aviation industry that is happening here.

"I believe we need a more unified approach in government, with more truly skilled business people in the system, who can make effective and timely decisions for our area. One of the things discussed with George Osborne was about trying to have more effective results from our LEPs and what the future looks like."

QuestUAV started manufacturing their aerial mapping drones on Amble Enterprise Park back in 2008. Since then they have grown to cater for a global market, with clients in Mexico, Brazil, Canada and South Korea.

"We work mostly in the areas of agriculture and surveying. We end up with a very accurate model of the area, so accurate you can take dimensions which can then be turned into engineering drawings. We take around 1500 hi-res images per flight. These are used by farmers to analyse crop health, and help answer food production issues."

Nigel's enthusiasm for his product is evident, but he is realistic about what he can achieve in the near future. QuestUAV have recently taken a new office suite in The Core, Newcastle, but remain committed to their manufacturing base in Amble.

"We're starting to attract some really big clients now. Wells Fargo asked us to pitch for 900 UAVs and the Brazillian government's food agency is also talking with us.

"These are £10m. contracts, were we able to fulfil them. We're not big enough yet. We have plans to expand over the next three to five years, to expand our staff to 60 in four different locations around the world," said Nigel. "But our workshops are staying in Amble."

Fears that Council charges may lead to more flytipping

Northumberland residents taking rubble, soil and plasterboard to household waste recovery centres in the county are being advised that from September 14, a small charge will apply for some items.

But concerns have been raised that this will lead to more flytipping, as some will attempt to avoid having to pay.

The council is under unprecedented pressure to save money to protect frontline services, and this is one of a number of measures that have been considered in order to avoid other service cuts.

The council consulted users of household waste centres, and almost half of those spoken to considered that a small charge for some items of DIY waste would be more acceptable than the other options of reducing opening hours or closing sites.

While local authorities have to dispose of ordinary household waste they are not

under an obligation to take DIY waste. A number of other councils have already introduced charges and some provide no facilities at all for DIY waste.

Soil, rubble and plasterboard are subject to a £2 per bag/sheet charge - with charges of £12 for a load in a standard car/hatchback; £20 in a small trailer/estate

car/small van; £40 in a longer trailer and £80 in a transit van. Users of vans, trailers and commercial vehicles will also need a permit.

Payments will be by credit or debit or pre-paid payment card only – and visitors to the sites should agree the charge and pay before depositing their waste.

These charges to residents will still not cover the total cost of disposing of this DIY waste and the council will continue to fund the rest of the cost. There is still no charge for taking garden waste and other DIY items such as sink units and bathroom suites to waste recovery centres.

Councillor Ian Swithenbank, cabinet member responsible for local services at Northumberland County Council said: "We know that our household waste centres are highly valued by residents, and introducing these small charges has not been an easy decision. However the council has to save money so that it can maintain essential frontline services, including those for the most vulnerable.

"We are not obliged to dispose of householders' soil, rubble and plasterboard, and a number of other councils have already introduced charges – many higher than these for Northumberland."

A vision for Amble football

There are Morpeth Town, Alnwick Town, Ashington FC and no Amble...FC? Yet, the local football history is shown on every cup the Cuddies play in. There is the name of Amble. Amble United in the 2000's, Amble Vikings in the 80s and 90s. Amble FC too reached the

Northern Alliance in the last ten years. The older generation tells of crowds watching a team capable of giving any side in the North East a good game in the 50s.

What is needed is a group of local people, united enough in a common vision to create a football club that will last! A club

that could support the development of local talent or give local lads somewhere to proudly play for their home town with their mates.

My hope and vision is a St. Cuthbert's club with a first team that attracts a healthy crowd on a Saturday afternoon, reserves, youth teams, and ladies' teams. I and the very committed players of our formative years have got things started. We now need help. Help to take responsibility to build a local football club, help with finance (it costs

£2,000 to play with one team in one league). Help also with coaching, and practical help like goalpost maintenance and kit laundering.

Margaret James celebrated 10 years of being in charge of one of the town's most popular pubs. She took over the Admiral Taverns owned pub on Albert Street in 2005 after having a number of links to the pub; her grandmother was actually born on the premises.

Customers joined Margaret and her husband Steve in celebrating her anniversary with a big party. She said: "We had a great time! I've got a great bunch of customers and it was brilliant to celebrate with them."

The Blue Bell is a true community local. Margaret offers home cooked Sunday dinners and the pub is a hive of local sporting activity. It has 14 different team activities including men and women's darts, dominoes and football teams.

Margaret is also raising money in memory of close friend and regular of the pub, David Coulson, who sadly passed away in February. Locals have so far raised more than $\pounds 1,000$ towards a defibrillator which will be located on the high street.

Goodbye yellow bird and thanks for the last 40 years



Crowds at Amble Harbour Day were able to watch one of the last rescue demonstrations by an RAF Boulmer Sea King.

The iconic yellow helicopters ended their 40 year service at the end of September. The government's decision to axe the search and rescue (SAR) cover by 202 Squadron at RAF Boulmer has been met with sadness by many local people.

The Ambler spoke to Engineering Shift Manager Dan Green who worked on the Sea Kings at Boulmer for nearly eight years, and for whom the Sea Kings were always a part of his life.

"It's going to be a miss. I think in some sense we've all taken it for granted that they'd be there. I remember looking at the Sea Kings as a child in my uncle's fishing boat at Newbiggin. And then when I was in the Army as an avionics engineer, I thought working on the Sea Kings at Boulmer would be my dream job."

Just as we're talking there's a noise overhead and Dan moves the phone away for a moment. "The last Sea King is actually flying over my house right now," he tells me.

Is he emotional about the end of the SAR at Boulmer?

"Oh definitely, and I know there's a lot of 'rough tough' blokes that will probably have a tear in their eyes.

"I think the overriding memory I will have is of the camaraderie. You would just drop everything to focus on getting the aircraft to respond at any time. The ethos of the crew and engineers was second to none... their willingness to do their job in any conditions or time of day. I don't think anything will replace that."

Most of the helicopter engineers and crew at Boulmer have found alternative work - though often at great distances from Northumberland. Dan now commutes on a week on, week off basis to Aberdeen where he works for helicopter company CHC Scotia.

"There's now no real aircraft engineering in the North East," said Dan. "It's quite a changed industry. Many of the engineers are now making trains in Newton Aycliffe."

A privately-run search and rescue service owned by US company Bristow will replace the Sea Kings. The new Sikorsky S-92 helicopters will be based in Caernarfon, Prestwick and Humberside, and run via the Coastguard Agency.

Dan is cautious about the change: "It leaves a massive empty hole in the North East. The new helicopters are faster aircraft, but if those aircraft are elsewhere, you can't replace the fact that there used to be an asset in Northumberland."

Remembering the 'forgotten army' VJ Day 2015





Amble played its part in the 70th anniversary of VJ Day, with a two minute silence and a moving tribute to the Far East soldiers and prisoners of war of WW2.

At the beginning of September, Amble and Warkworth British Legion held a Pipe Band Concert with Pie and Pea supper to commemorate VJ Day and to raise funds for the Poppy Appeal. The band played a rendition of "Heroes of Kohima" written to remember the 'forgotten 14th Army'

Local men who survived the work camps

A ugust 15 marked the 70th anniversary of the end of the war over Japan, and after the allies dropped two atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki World War 2 was brought to a close.

The 9th Division of the Northumberland Fusiliers were part of the allied forces sent to repel the Japanese troops.

Many soldiers were killed and the survivors became prisoners of war when General Percival surrendered in February 1942. The Japanese incarcerated many of the men in Changi Prison before dispersing them to work camps on other islands and by sea to Japan. It became for them a constant struggle to survive the cruel treatment and harsh conditions and even those who returned endured ill health and nightmares as a result of their experiences.

The late Clarence Hedley of Amble F.E.P.O.W. Club was one of those imprisoned. He kept a list of his fellow Amble comrades in the 9th Division, Northumberland Fusiliers who survived their ordeal in the Far East. Most of these ex fusiliers are now deceased.

Among them were:


Based on provisional results, on average, schools in Northumberland achieved 57% 5A* to C grades, including English and Maths, which is a significant improvement on last year's 53% figure.

Roseate Tern on Coquet Island

European funding announced for Coquet Island

Funding has been secured for the RSPB's work on Coquet Island from the European LIFE fund, to progress the work on safeguarding the roseate tern population there. Coquet Island is the only place left in the United Kingdom where roseate terns nest.

The funding comes as the numbers of nesting roseates have topped the 100 mark for the first time since the reserve became a nature sanctuary in the 1970s.

Paul Morrison, Coquet's site manager, explains: "A lot of effort has been devoted to safeguarding and providing ideal conditions for the roseate terns on Coquet Island, and as a result, the numbers attracted to the island have increased gently but steadily over the past 15 years.

"This is set against a backdrop of total decline and loss of roseate colonies elsewhere in the country.

This funding will help with continuing our work on Coquet for the next five years and also aims to help reestablish roseate terns in places in Europe where they were once colonised."

Coquet Island, despite its tiny size, is home to more than 44,000 nesting seabirds each year and is now firmly on the international stage for conservation best practice.

The safeguarding project was launched on October 1 and one of the plans is to provide a live video link from the island to the World Wide Web, so everyone can enjoy seeing the bird spectacle on Coquet Island.

DOG KENNELS PLAYS ROCK MUSIC TO SCARED DOGS

I wanted to know what happens to pets/animals on bonfire night. So I asked a local vet and the dog kennels at Whitley Bay:
I was wondering do animals get scared from bonfire night and what do you do? Do you think bonfire night a good thing?

Richard from the kennels said:
"I wish more people asked that
question. The weeks surrounding bonfire
night fill us with dread.

"As you probably know, most shops start selling fireworks from October so, they're easy to buy. In Whitley Bay from about mid- October there are fireworks being let off almost every night.

"As soon as we hear or see them we go out to the kennels. Some dogs hide and others will become agitated and are looking for help.

If there are not too many fireworks, we can calm

them down usually in about half an hour or so by distracting the dogs by being loud and playing, but that's still not much fun if we are having to help them at 11 at night or later!"

"Firework displays are different.
Usually the people organizing it will come and let us know in advance.
Just before the display is due to start

, we go out to the kennels with a large stereo and play very loud rock music as loud as we possibly can. We also set up some portable floodlights and try to make the kennels as light as possible. The hope is to drown out the bangs and lights from the fireworks as much as

But, it doesn't prevent the dogs from getting really stressed out and upset – it's not a nice thing to watch!"

Fiona at the vets gave some advice for dogs at home "Firstly the dog should be kept at home in a part of the home they feel comfortable and secure in. Extra soundproofing of the room can be helpful. Scared dogs often like to run to a 'bolt hole' for example a cupboard, under a bed or their favourite sleeping place so this area should always be available.

"Long term there are also some special programmes to introduce dogs to loud noises but these have to be started many months before firework night to be helpful."

So keep your animals safe on bonfire night.

HIBERNATION

Hibernation is an amazing procedure in which animals store energy as fat to keep them warm over winter. Running about uses a lot of energy so sleeping allows them to store energy and warmth while it's chilly.

Some animals sleep a lot, but not true hibernation.

I asked the Ulgham nature sanctuary what they do for their animals that hibernate in winter and they said that they have two animals that hibernate, their tortoise and the hedgehogs.

They stop feeding the tortoise before he goes into hibernation so he can sleep with an empty stomach (it's good for him, don't worry!). They weigh him, put him in a crate with lots of straw and, when he wakes, they place him in a bowl of lukewarm water to rehydrate him.

They will either over winter the hedgehogs or let them sleep, depending on whether they are over or under 500gms. If they are over, they will hibernate just like the tortoise. If the hedgehogs are under, they will over winter them- put them under heat lamps and provide them plenty of food and drink so they have no need to hibernate. Because of their size, they wouldn't survive hibernation.

Ulgham nature sanctuary had to close down to public and their only source of donation after a zoo license was requested. Now they are relying on us to help save the animals, even blankets

Amble tribute taken to national memorial




Apoppy cross tribute has been placed in the National Memorial Arboretum on behalf of the people of Amble.

What are the county council's priorities?

Residents are to be given a final chance to have a say on a key planning document for the county.

The core strategy sets out the county council's priorities for Northumberland in the future – which include the creation of 10,000 additional jobs by 2031 and extending choice in the housing market.

The council wants to make sure that Northumberland thrives economically, while preserving and enhancing the county's special environmental qualities.

"This will involve releasing some green belt land as there aren't enough brownfield and previously developed sites. However this is only proposed in exceptional circumstances," said Councillor Allan Hepple, cabinet member for economic growth at Northumberland County Council. "I hope that people will take the opportunity to look at and comment on the final plan before it goes off for independent examination. You will be able to comment on whether you feel that it is a sound plan that is able to be delivered."

A leaflet will be posted through every door explaining the consultation and how to have your say. Drop-in events will be held across Northumberland, where residents will be able to ask questions of council officers.

The full draft strategy, all of the evidence work that supports it and feedback forms will be available on www.northumberland. gov.uk from October 14, 2015. Following this consultation it is expected that the core strategy will be submitted to Government in March 2016, with the examination taking place during that summer.

Tell them what you think

People living in Northumberland are being asked for their views about a range of issues, including what it is like to live in the area, what they think needs improving and how satisfied they are with how the county council runs things.

More than 8,000 questionnaires are being sent by post over the next few weeks to a random sample of residents in the County to help the Council to prioritise and develop its services. The results of the survey are expected in January.

The questionnaire is being carried out on behalf of the council by market research experts Ipsos Mori. All completed surveys will be treated confidentially and only seen by IpsosMori. Northumberland Council will receive a report on the overall findings.

Deputy Leader for Northumberland County Council, Cllr Dave Ledger said: "It's really important that we ask the people of Northumberland for their views on the area, our services and their priorities.

"The residents' survey is one of the ways in which we do this. If you receive one of the questionnaires please do take the time to complete and return it. We are here to serve the people of Northumberland so it's crucial we know what residents think and care about, especially during these difficult financial times."

Keep Out!

Northumberland Wildlife
Trust is strongly reminding
members of the public that
its Hauxley nature reserve on
Druridge Bay is still closed,
whilst its new Wildlife Discovery
Centre is under construction.
The site will remain closed until
spring/summer 2016.

The reminder follows a number of recent incidences where people have blatantly ignored the closed sign, not to mention the padlocked gate, and climbed over the fence to get onto the reserve.

Not only is such behaviour causing damage to the fence, it is also dangerous as the entire reserve is classed as a construction site with everybody having to comply with the guidelines set out by the Health and Safety Executive.

Now, volunteers who would have been assisting with the construction are being diverted to patrolling the site and repairing the fencing, which in turn, is having an effect on the building's progress.

There are still five other reserves along the bay for visitors to enjoy: Cresswell Foreshore, Cresswell Pond, Druridge Pools, East Chevington and Linton Lane.

news from Amble Development Trust

Welcome to Trust Life. I won't say anything about the weather or the summer disappearing before it got started. I begin with the news that we have at long last received the first tranche of Persimmon funds.

So, to begin the big spend we have instructed Sullivan Associates to complete the plans for the housing units then go out to tender.

Next we have asked a local ground works company to review the drainage problem at the welfare as well as items requiring repair on the play area.

Once all items are costed, we will discuss with user groups a work priority list to see what we can achieve with the funds available.

Unfortunately while we repair the facilities in one place, someone causes more damage elsewhere. Recently a group of youngsters decided to remove part of the low level fence around the children's play area. Fortunately these actions were seen, the fence panel secured and the incident reported to the police. For this we thank ACT members, Ivor from JCSC and John Kelly – saving the Trust from a large replacement bill!

Harbour Village. Harbour Week - Sarah the HV co-ordinator organised a week of activities leading up to Lifeboat Day. Pirates and marauders wandered the quayside looking for their next 'recruits'. Pieces of 8 were distributed widely around the town to be collected for the players' treasure chest. Over the two weekends there were craft and food markets, with produce from local allotment holders being given for donations to the RNLI appeal. Over £800 was collected for the appeal.

Before Christmas there will be other events and activities organised. Information can be found in the Seafood Centre window or on the website: www.ambleharbourvillage. co.uk

The Seafood Centre is now operating and open Thursdays, Fridays and Saturday mornings for the sale of fresh fish. Times are displayed on the premises. While we have received some criticism about the opening times our intentions were not to provide direct over the counter sales. We are not here to compete with the long-established business in the town. We are looking for new methods and markets for local produce, such as internet sales and local restaurants. We have responded to requests for direct sales but within limited periods and obviously only when fish is available. Unfortunately, many people believe all species of fish to be available all year round. One told us to look at a particular supermarket fish counter, missing the point that if it wasn't landed on the North East Coast we don't sell it. I wonder where the supermarket got theirs.

Another aspect of the Centre is educating the public on seasonality, local catch and use of 'ugly' fish, a term used to describe the lesser known species, often more tasty than the better known cod or haddock. We have a lot of work to do on that score!

We welcome Northumbria Police to Fourways2. They are now installed in their new offices. With the Police, Town Council, ourselves, The Ambler, employment services and other business tenants we have achieved what the building was designed as: a community hub offering a broad range of services.

Public consultation on the one way system will begin either late September or early October. If you live in the area involved (bottom of Queen Street, George, Lawson and Leazes streets) you will receive information on the project and how to make your opinion known. Everyone else can check on the county council website.

If you have comments to make, please make them – these will inform future action. This is your opportunity to be involved and shape the traffic system in the town.

Next: the Torchlight Procession on November 22nd. The most anticipated event in the town? Looking forward to it already!

NIFCA's new patrol vessel

new fisheries patrol vessel named Aafter one of Northumberland's most famous saints is set to become a familiar sight on our coastline.

St Aidan, the new £700,000 vessel belonging to the Northumberland Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority (NIFCA), was officially named by Her Grace the Duchess of Northumberland in August.



The new 16 metre GRP (glass re-enforced plastic) catamaran, which replaces the 14-year-old St Oswald, will be used for a mixture of fisheries enforcement work, environmental studies along with seabed scanning and underwater surveying.

St Aidan has double the speed of her predecessor, while using only half the fuel. It can cover the 60 miles to Berwick at the northern extremity of its patrol area from its base in the North Shields in three hours.

The NIFCA's district extends six nautical miles into the sea and runs from the Scottish border to the southern border of North Tyneside Council and includes river estuaries

and the existing UK and EU and international marine protected areas.

The organisation is jointly funded via a precept by Northumberland County Council and North Tyneside Council.


Authority Chairman Northumberland County Councillor Robert Arckless said: "Our coastline is one of our greatest treasures and it's vital the seas are managed

The Harbour village has been an undoubted success after startup problems have been solved. It is a positive asset to the town's economy. It has created traffic issues but the experimental one way system seems to have improved the traffic flow and given some extra parking spaces. Its layout is due for final consultation, after which I think we will have a sensible traffic flow system. Parking stays an issue: it is a problem but a working group will hopefully arrive at a practical solution.

The Welfare ground has been better maintained this year with the help of a few volunteers and work is under way to solve some of the long standing problems. The skate park remains popular as does the children's play area. Unfortunately this area is still damaged by vandals. I just wish the perpetrators could see the effect on our small children, robbing them of their fun.

The new affordable housing development will provide excellent quality housing for local people. The Paddlers redevelopment nears completion as I write and will be a very pleasant area for young children. The Shorebase Trust, and the Youth Project amongst others, continue to play an important role in the social structure of Amble.

The new bins are made from recycled plastic with a wood effect, and should be more robust. Please report any vandalism as every damaged bin is one less replaced elsewhere in the town.



On 15th August 2015, Alnwick Tri Club hosted a try-a-tri event at the Amble Pool & Leisure Centre. Under the banner of GoTri, which is the triathlon equivalent of a Park Run, a family event was organised with children's and adult fun races.

The 8-13 year olds raced over 80m swim, 1.5km bike and 500m run with the bike being three laps of the same grassed area used for the run. The bike was surprisingly tough considering it is right on the links so has no real hills but the undulations in the grass, combined with the grass being very wet from 2 days of rain made slippery and difficult conditions.

This is the first time Alnwick Tri Club have organised a children's race due to restrictions such as the children having to be within sight of a marshal at all times and they cannot cycle on the road so it is very difficult to find a suitable and safe venue, but this was perfectly contained and probably the toughest children's pool based race in the area due to it being on the undulating grass.

Sadie Bryson won the girls race in her first triathlon and Ben Murray-John won the boys race, both in fantastic times but special mention goes to the youngest competitor Maia Humphreys (8 years old), for whom the 80m swim was a huge challenge and the bike was so hard that she was exhausted by the time she came to run but there was never any thoughts of quitting. After finishing, it took her a while but even she started talking about the next race she would do.

The Adult race was over the slightly longer distances of 200m swim, 3 miles bike and 1km run. The bike for this was on the Links Road from Amble to



Amble Triathletes battle heat and a tornado in World Championships

Sporting prowess doesn't come much better than to represent your country in a World Championship. To have three local people competing for TeamGB in the 2015 Triathlon World Championships is a remarkable achievement.

Amble athletes Tracey Sample, husband Ian Simon and Aquathlon European Champion Jo Gascoigne-Owens travelled to the Championships in Chicago for the four day event, which was held on 15-19 September.

Jo competed in the Elite Aquathlon, and Ian and Tracey in the Age Group Aquathlon and Sprint Triathlon on back to back days - a tough schedule.

This was Jo's first race as an Elite so she was up against the world's best swimrunners. Could she reach their standard? She was 10th out of the water and running an 18 min 37 sec 5k as the 6th fastest run, putting her in a finish position of 8th.

The age group racing took place in the fierce midday sun at 36 deg C. Ian was 16th out of the water and ran a 17:55 5k, running 4th fastest of the day to finish in 5th position in the male 45-49 age group. Tracey was 20th out of the water and finished 19th in the Female 45-49 age group.

The following day both Ian and Tracey were in action again, swimming and running but with a 20km bike between. The heat was worse at 38 deg C; tornado warnings almost cancelled the race. In fact the final races of the day were rescheduled and distances reduced to ensure the safety of competitors. The tornado did arrive - just two hours after the finish of the race.

Unfortunately a current was in place that made the swim worse than the aquathlon. Ian was 43rd out of the water but 17th fastest on the bike and had the 6th fastest run to pull himself up to 12th place in the male 45-49 category.

Tracey was 47th out the water but despite gaining places on the bike lost most of them again on the run, to finish 46th in her age group.

Jo's was an exceptional achievement as she was racing against professional athletes.

Tracey wrote on her Facebook page: "Again extreme weather conditions dictated the outcome of my race. I finished mid table but wanted



to be top third. Not as good as I wanted but better than I initially thought when I finished. Tried to enjoy the atmosphere and did get some high fives in at the end. It is an

amazing experience and I'm privileged to be part of it."

Jo told The Ambler: "It was a great experience all round. I was 8th in the Elite Aquathlon, so delighted with that in a very strong field.

"Tracey and Ian did really well in the aquathlon and triathlon too. Not bad for three folks from Amble!"
