Despite the weather, the Puffin Festival was another joyful, quirky event. "It was a wonderful weekend" said Events Committee chairman Bart Rippon. "We want to thank everyone for coming and making it another great event."

The organisers were delighted with the huge number of visitors to the stalls and activities over the bank holiday weekend. Blyth Valley Samba entertained the crowds on Saturday, along with Tribe Zuza tribal dancers, local singer Brian English, and street band Meze Mundo. On Sunday, Caribbean Crew steel band, Brian English, Tribe Zuza and Salida band took

to the stage, as youngsters had a great time dancing with giant puffin Tommy Noddy. builds was very impressive. Two winners received a £50 voucher from Seaside Travel Amble. The

The sandcastle competitions on both days was run by the wonderful Ranger Jane, and proved immensely popular. Judges said that despite strong winds and a high tide, the number and quality of the Come and Try Kayaking with Coquet Shorebase Trust also proved popular, and the winner of the Puffin Rescue game, sponsored by Puffin Cruises received a cuddly puffin prize.

Fifteen people entered

the Puffin Festival landscape artist of the year competition, organised by Dovecote Street Arts; fortunately they and their equipment survived the gusty winds intact! The winner won a weekend stay at Radcliffes Lodge, the two runners up won a £50 voucher for a meal at the Old Boat House.

DryWater Arts organised a host of cultural activities over the whole weekend, and the town's shops included puffin artwork painted by local school children. Guided walks, poetry readings and nature talks were very well attended, as was the ever popular dog show organised by Northumberland Dog Rescue.

Organisers thanked this year's main sponsor Coquet Cottages for their generous donation, and to Alncom who helped make the Puffin Cam live streaming possible in the Town Square.

On behalf of the Events Committee, Matthew Connolly said "It's been a whirlwind of a weekend. You could have blown me over with the joyful and enthusiastic response to the Festival!

He added, "We're a small team and we'd really like additional ideas and help for upcoming events such as the Christmas Lights Procession and next year's Puffin Festival."

Swimblers join national protest against sewage RESCUE BUR RIVERS

A swimming group has staged a beach protest against sewage pollution in Amble.

The Amble Swimblers took part in a nationwide Surfers Against Sewage Paddle-Out protest to demand action against pollution being pumped into seas and rivers.

The protest coincided with the launch of a public consultation by the Coquet River Action Group (CRAG) to gain bathing water status for the Little Shore at Amble. Judith Gleave, spokesperson for the 994-strong Swimblers' group and a member of CRAG, said: "We wanted to take part in this protest to show how angry we are about the appalling way our water companies are behaving. As Swimblers we take care of each other and part of that is ensuring the water we swim in is clean. We use the Surfers Against Sewage app to check for discharges and there are far too many."

Bathing status would mean

the water at the Little Shore would be tested weekly, during the season, by the Environmental Agency, for harmful bacteria like E.coli and Intestinal Enterococci.

Water quality would be classed as 'excellent', 'good', 'sufficient' or 'poor' and public signs would have to be displayed, informing bathers of the status. Water companies would also be legally required to reduce raw sewage discharges.

The campaign for bathing water status at the Little Shore

is also being supported by the Harbour Commission, Amble WI and the Amble and Warkworth Rotary Club.

Community support is needed for the application. The Amble Little Shore survey can be found online at coquetriveractiongroup.org look for Bathing Water Survey.

The Amble Swimblers had a stall at the Puffin Festival, giving out campaign information and chatting to visitors about the benefits of protecting the Little Shore for locals, tourists and wildlife.

Town councillors step down after fifty years of service

Over half a century of service has been clocked up by three town councillors who have now retired.

Helen Lewis, Craig Weir and Kate Morrison are stepping down from Amble Town Council, but before they left, they met with The Ambler to reflect on the changes they've seen over the years.

"Tve been on the council for 23 years," said Helen, "but I'm not the longest serving councillor." [Ian Hinson served on the town council for over 40 years, Eric Alcock for 40 and Robert Arckless for 34].

We asked if it's good to have people on the council for so long, and how do they encourage new people to come on - and, importantly, to stay on.

Helen: "I think it's good, as long as the person is open to new ideas and thoughts. They've got to be flexible. And also, as long as people aren't coming on the council just to stop

something happening."

Craig has been a town councillor for 14 years, serving as mayor for twelve of those.

"Good councillors have to deal with the whole community," he said. "I think a lot of people don't know what a councillor does. Some people join for fixed reasons, but they soon learn we have a set of rules and protocols and we have to stick to that."

Kate joined the council just after Craig, "When we moved here, all you saw in the Gazette was bad stuff about Amble. There's not so many people coming forward [for the council] now, but they should know they can make a difference."

Helen, who served as mayor for two years, added, "You have to realise you'll never please everybody. What has been decided might not be what you want, but it's a democratic process."

The councillors were proud of what Amble Town Council

had achieved over the last couple of decades.

"When I moved here, I was told by my family not to go," said Craig. "Since we've been here, people are now proud of being from Amble. I think we've helped give a sense of pride in the community and boosted community spirit."

Highlights have also included working together with other groups to bring about change and developing links with local organisations. The council has worked to encourage existing or fledgling groups to develop, and they've made big changes to the Paddlers, the Memorial Gardens, the cemeteries, and the allotments.

Service Level Agreements with Northumberland County Council means the town council no longer have to employ people directly – which would include costly ongoing training and equipment.

"This hasn't been cheap, but

with all the rules and regulations on the type of equipment, training etc, it was beyond what the town council could provide" said Helen.

If there are regrets, then lack of self publicity is probably one of them, with a feeling that there's a lot of hard work done behind the scenes and people tend only to see the end result – or lack of it.

"One thing I'm sorry about is the town doesn't have better recreational facilities," said Helen. "A while ago we offered to pay for a part time youth worker to work out what was needed. We worked on that plan for about 18 months but it fell because NCC told us they couldn't find anyone to fill the post. And Amble lacks a wet weather recreational facility. Again, that is not for the want of trying."

There's obviously a lot of work to do as a town councillor, which might explain why it attracts some older and/or retired people, but it doesn't preclude younger people with jobs or busy lives from joining. Some meetings with NCC are between 9-5pm, but as Helen says, there are ways to manage that.

"Come to a council meeting, see what we do. You have to be aware you're making a commitment, but the rewards can be worthwhile."

Said Helen: "We'll all miss being part of Amble Town Council. We've been so involved for so long. And sometimes our memories might be useful, so we're here to offer advice if the new members need it." Anna Williams

Shaun Kelly told the Ambler that he and his dad John were really pleased with the reaction to all their work. "We started on the old electrical shop at the end of last year. We're really pleased with what we've done, and we're

glad everyone's happy with our work."

The shop has been totally renovated, and a new building is currently being created on the



site of the old back yard. It will feature a large skylight.

"There's been some interest in it already; it'll suit some little business, and that's good for Amble," said Shaun.

School build forges ahead before changes granted permission

Construction of Amble's new ✓school is progressing well, with an estimated completion date of September 2026.

However, at a meeting with young journalists from The Ambler, (see centre pages,) it was revealed that modifications to the building being constructed have not yet had planning permission.

Roddy Graham, Senior Project Manager at Kier

Construction confirmed that the building being constructed was not the design given planning permission last November, but a new design which was submitted in April and has yet to be agreed.

At the meeting, the young people pointed out that outdoor learning areas were important for many children. They asked why so much had been removed in the new design.

NCC Leader Glen Sanderson

expressed sympathy with them over the loss of the outside learning facilities, including a wildlife pond. He said "This is very important. I hate being stuck inside. We will have a discussion about this."

Roddy Graham said "We have to build the plan we are instructed to build. The costs for the [previous] plan were made three years ago. They are not reflected in 2025 prices."

Sue Aviston, Head of School Organisation and Resources, told the young people that the plans had been simplified to create more value for money.

The final decision whether or not to pass the modified plans will be made by the Northumberland Area Planning Committee. At the time of writing, there is no date set for this meeting.

Amble Development Trust said "In the absence of funding for

Amble to have its own sports and leisure centre, we have looked at options for providing a variety of activities by working with NCC and JCSC.

"By combining the facilities of the three sites - JCSC, Amble Welfare and retaining the existing gym, we would look to create a sport and leisure village."

She added, "We would not be looking to compete with JCSC, but offer a wider range of activities than each site could provide individually, and possibly more than could be achieved by a leisure centre."



Capt'n Coquet's Chronicles

Past times: How we counted the puffins

With another successful Puffin Festival behind us, it's a good time to think about how the puffins are doing on Coquet Island. To do that, wardens and volunteers set aside a day each year to carry out the Puffin Census. This count is important as it gives us a regular scientific insight into how well the puffin population is doing.

Puffins live on the sea over winter, many on the Atlantic Ocean (hence their full name the "Atlantic Puffin"). If the weather at sea is reasonable over the wintertime, more puffins survive to return to Coquet Island. If the winter is harsh, many puffins perish or get washed up exhausted in large numbers - referred to as a Puffin wreck. We have been lucky over the past few years and lots of puffins have returned

Puffins nest underground making them difficult to count,

so over many years, a standard technique was developed to make sure they were counted in a way that could be compared with counts in the past and in the future. It is difficult, time consuming and disturbing for the birds, to count every burrow so a set of 30 sample areas were chosen (each covering 20 square metres).

It took five or six experienced volunteers to check each burrow for occupancy. This involved looking for evidence such as feathers, discarded fish, a latrine, smell, or even a puffin popping out to object! It also involved putting your arm down the burrow to feel for an egg (or a puffin). Eventually, a long-term researcher devised a batterypowered micro-camera on a long cable, to check burrows quickly and efficiently. This technique was found to be accurate and saved lots of time, reducing



disturbance across the colony. With some simple maths, the number of occupied burrows for the entire island was estimated.

Puffins have been doing well, and numbers reached 30,000 pairs five years ago. That's a remarkable achievement for these hardy, iconic seabirds. The result was so astonishing that we had to repeat the census that year to make sure!

Only scrubland?

No Decision Notice has yet been issued, due to procrastination over who has responsibility for maintaining the Gut culvert. Let's hope that our newly elected councillors will be more proactive when other sites come up for development around Amble.

In the meantime, go and look at Braid Hill – is that really "only scrubland"?

Hugh's views: Spring Ups and Downs

Somehow Spring arrived without any great fanfare in the natural world around Amble. Cold winds, low overnight temperatures and a lack of precipitation did little to persuade nature that the new season was upon us.

At the beginning of April, a dead barn owl found on the verge beside Rotary Way did little to improve the mood. The unfortunate bird carried a BTO ring on its right leg which later provided information revealing that it had been ringed locally and that the bird was just over three years old.

I saw my first swallow of the year in Amble on 16 April, as it skimmed over buildings in the Coquet Industrial Estate and the first house martin was heard calling from a previous years nest on 26 April beside Percy

Drive as temperatures remained stubbornly low.

Two adult rabbits, one beside Coquet Vets the other beside Tiger Lifting, at either end of May, showed advanced symptoms of myxomatosis, with closed eyes and a reluctance to move. The first cases which I had seen in a long time.

The dry weather continued into May but surprisingly a local colony of house martins seemed to have little problem locating a plentiful supply of mud, despite the lack of rain, as two new nests were constructed under the eaves of a house close to our own.

A chat with a resident of Hauxley Grange revealed that the industrious birds were using mud exposed by falling water levels in ponds which collect surface water from the new estate's surface water drainage system. Both nests were completed by the end of the month.

On the last day of May, a neighbour very kindly informed me of the presence of three otters

at the weir on the Coquet which he and his wife had discovered while out walking early one morning. Possibly a female with cubs which were there two days later but which eluded my own efforts to locate them.

In early June a visit to Hauxley Wildlife Discovery Centre was rewarded with excellent views of lots of waterbirds and in particular several avocets, the RSPBs emblem. These graceful wading birds have only recently started to colonise Northumberland.

Later, while we sat watching from the comfort of the excellent café, a roe deer appeared from the trees at the side of the lake and then for an hour browsed along the shoreline, completing a memorable visit.

Update on firearms incident


In the last issue of The Ambler, we reported that a man was arrested in Amble by police on suspicion of making threats to

over their internet line.



An appreciative crowd watched the Memorial Clock Tower centenary service in the Town Square on 10 May. The event also commemorated the 80th anniversary of VE Day.

The band of the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers paraded along Church Street and Queen Street to the Town Square, after which the Deputy Lord Lieutenant Janette Milburn and others unfurled Union Flags which had covered the names of the fallen from both World Wars.

A service took place with readings and hymns from Coquet Churches Together, followed by a speech by the Mayor Craig Weir, who described how the clock tower came into being.

He explained that the land had been donated by Edward Lawson-Smith whose two sons had died in WW1. The memorial itself had been paid for entirely by public subscription and fundraising.

The clock tower was unveiled on 9 May 1925. At the event, the regimental band of the

Northumberland Fusiliers paraded through the town, supported by the bands of Amble and Radcliffe. A guard of honour was provided by 36 men from C Company, Northumberland Fusiliers.

It was therefore fitting to welcome the Fusiliers regimental band to the centenary event.

Music including the Last Post and the National Anthem was played by the band. A reception was then held at the Parish Hall for invited guests. Anna Williams

Rare marine plant is focus of new arts project

The rare marine plant seagrass is the subject of a new arts project centred around Amble.

Arts organisation Dovecote Street Arts, based in Amble, has partnered with the Stronger Shores Team working within Durham Wildlife Trust to deliver a new creative programme that will raise awareness surrounding seagrass.

Stronger Shores Engagement Officer Blair Watson said, "Alongside the other habitats investigated through Stronger Shores, kelp forests and oyster reefs, seagrass meadows are a key focus for understanding how we can protect our coasts against the effects of coastal erosion and flooding."

He added, "We've chosen to work with groups in Amble, as alongside Lindisfarne, it is one of the only areas in Northumberland, and the wider North East, where you can find seagrass.

"Seagrass is important as it helps to retain sediment which slows coastal erosion, provides a vital habitat to marine life, and is also extremely effective at carbon capture, aiding in the fight against climate change."

Amble marine tragedy remembered in Bridlington



Aplaque commemorating the crew of RAF Pinnace 1386 who died in Amble, has been unveiled in Bridlington Harbour.

The tragedy took place on 29 September 1969, when RAF Search and Rescue craft Pinnace 1386 overturned while approaching Amble harbour in severe weather.

Now a plaque has been unveiled in Bridlington Harbour. honouring the 1104 Marine Craft Unit based in Bridlington, including those who died during bombing in WW11, and those involved in the Amble tragedy. A wreath was laid by a member of the Marine Craft Unit.

At the time, Amble lifeboats, together with HM Coastguard and the Search and Rescue squadron from RAF Acklington spent hours attempting to rescue the crew of the stricken vessel. Local divers also joined in to help free the men.

One crew member survived after Royal Navy divers managed to create a hole in the upturned hull, from which he managed to escape.

There is a plaque commemorating the incident at Amble's Little Shore.

WHAT WE FOUND OUT ABOUT THE BOSS of northumberland county council

WHEN WE SAW that the plans for our new school had been changed, we decided to ask the people responsible for making the decisions. We were hyped when Councillor Glen Sanderson who is Leader of Northumberland County Council offered to come and meet us, together with Councillor Guy Renner-Thompson, and some of the team. We decided to take the opportunity to find out more about him and what he does.

Eden: What was it like when you were growing up in Northumberland?

Glen Sanderson: I've lived near Felton nearly all my life. I'm a farmer. I spent some time in America and went to university there. Then I worked for Farmer's Weekly magazine. I wrote an article about someone I didn't like. They complained and I lost my job.

Skylar: Did you like school? What was your favourite subject?

Yes I loved school. I went to Felton First School, then to a boarding school in Gosforth but I didn't like boarding. Then I went to a different school. (He later told us this was the same school where the actor who played Hagrid in Harry Potter went.) I believe the more you work

at school, the more you ask questions, it's the best way to get on in life. My favourite subjects were History and English.

Indie: What was your dream when you were

My dream was to have children and a close happy family.

Maisie: Why did you want to become a county councillor?

The county council closed a road! There was an opencast coal site near where I lived and the council closed the road without telling anyone. I didn't want that to happen again. I enjoy helping people and I wanted to join so I could get things done for the people I represent.

Nina: Tell us about your job; are you the boss, and do you get to decide what happens?

Guy Renner-Thompson: Glen is the boss, but he doesn't make all the decisions. Councillors are advised by the council officers. But it's the councillors you elect who make the final decision, although they have a team behind

as Leader of Northumberland County Council?

GS: There's been a range of difficult things. Sometimes deciding on a way forward that's not always what people want, but you feel it's right. It's never been a huge problem. I try to talk things through, try to find a compromise. 5,300 people work for NCC; every decision you make counts. We have £,1billion spend per year. More people are getting older, they need more care. People with SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) need extra care. There are increasing costs to NCC and we have to pay staff the right amount.

Indie: What is your favourite part of Amble?

GRT: Food, Amble has fantastic restaurants. GS: I love the sounds at the Marina, of the boats and the rigging.

Esme: What would you do for Amble if you had £100 million to spend here?

GS: If we had that amount of money – I wish we had, I would build a new Leisure Centre.

Nina: What's the naughtiest thing you did as a young person?

No-one would go on record to answer this, although GS and GRT admitted that when they Issy: What's the hardest thing you've ever had to do were young they had sometimes been naughty

New school plans: we ask NCC what happened to our pond?

WE NOTICED THAT the county council want to change the plans for our new school. In the plans which were agreed in November, there were lots of outdoor things such as a wildlife pond, outdoor learning areas and quiet seating areas. These seemed to us like good things to have, especially for students who learn better outside or need quiet spaces at break. We asked the team responsible why they now want to remove them.

Along with Councillors Glen Sanderson and Guy Renner-Thompson, we met Sue Aviston, Head of School Organisation & Resources, and Roddy Graham, Senior Project Manager at Kier Construction.

Skylar: Why are we having a new school (rather than just fix the old one)? GRT: The decision to build a new school in Amble is a big one for NCC. We've built new schools in Ponteland, Hexham, Seaton Delaval, Berwick and Amble. We think a new school is best for children in Amble. We have the best schools in the NE. A new school is good for both children and teachers. There are cheaper running costs in a new school.

Nina: We would like to know why you put the green plan (which is nicer) to be approved, then you just changed it to be the grey plan (which is smaller), when you already started work on building it? Why promise things then you discard the idea and do something else?

Sue Aviston: The green plan went into planning. The grey plan has been simplified to create more value for money

Eden: Why is there not a pond anymore, or the outside learning areas? Also where are the other outdoor ideas e.g the canopy/shaded seating area to let people stay outside more, or the quiet seating areas for people who enjoy time in smaller groups?

GS: This is very important. I hate being stuck inside. We will have a

SA: The pond is a safeguarding issue. There would need to be fencing. The needs of young people are different than in the past. We need to run the building to be cost effective.

RG: We are building the grey plan. We build the plan we are instructed to build. The costs for the green plan were made three years ago. They are not reflected in 2025 prices.

We say: It looks like money is the reason that we won't get our pond in the end, and we think that is a shame.

Warden's update from Coquet Island

At the time of writing, the season is in full swing, with eggs hatching and small fluffy tern chicks running around shouting for their fishy supper. Puffins are flying in with sand eels stuffed in their beaks dodging the Black-headed gulls to make it back to the pufflings waiting in the burrows.

Currently the wardens are undertaking the annual censuses and doing productivity monitoring for many of the birds. Whilst it is too early to say how well everything has done, there seems to be a good number of all our breeding birds.

Previously I have spoken about the hard work that the island staff and volunteers had put in on rebuilding North Terrace, an important area for the breeding Roseate Tern. Now halfway through the breeding season it is satisfying to see that work being appreciated by the birds, with more breeding Common Tern recorded in that area than last year and roseate

terns using the new boxes directly behind the wall.

Restabling the terrace means that we have no fear of the

provide necessary safe breeding spaces in areas of fragile ground.

With a dry early season dominated by northerly winds



ground collapsing beneath our feet ensuring that we can safely undertake crucial monitoring of the only UK breeding colony of Roseate Terns.

The Puffins have also taken to the artificial burrows that we installed to prevent digging in areas prone to collapse and whilst the box with the camera unfortunately wasn't successful, it has shown that these boxes can

we didn't get many unusual spring migrating birds stopping off. However, we were treated to a male Ring Ouzel in April and several Black Redstarts were seen enjoying the areas where we had cut the vegetation back for the terns. The northerly winds also meant that we have been seeing hundreds of Manx Shearwaters passing, along with some great views of Arctic

Skuas. These birds don't breed in the area and are normally only seen whilst flying past or sitting on the water. We have, however, seen the return of the very rare Bridled Tern which stopped on 13 June for a few hours and it was spotted further south the next day. This is the second year this incredible bird, usually found in the tropics, has turned up.

The recent warm weather has seen an explosion of butterflies on the island with Red Admirals seen wherever we look. The resident Rock Pipits have been loving these tasty snacks. Nature doing its thing. Whilst we have yet to see the Orca off Coquet Island we have enjoyed sightings of Bottle-Nosed Dolphins along with our first few minke whales of the season. Hopefully, the nice weather will continue and our breeding birds will have a successful season.

Hello everyone, welcome back to Trust Life as we look forward to summer and sunshine – we're always hopeful!

Playzone - At long last the Playzone is now finished, with the long awaited signage complete with QR code for bookings, now in situ.

Community asset transfer - In the last edition I outlined an idea we had mooted with NCC to retain the existing gym on the current site at JCSC. The Trust has submitted an Expression of Interest for Asset Transfer, subject to receiving a copy of the Building Condition Report – which will outline the state of the building so we can evaluate any works that may be required. This has been requested and is waited.

Town Square market - The market that has been operating in the town square seems to be well received by the majority. Comments received are 'the more that is happening the better, and will attract more people here'. Fingers crossed it works.

Neighbourhood Development Planning (NDP)- The Housing Needs Assessment was received at the end of May and while it is a large document,

the identification of need for affordable homes is shown in stark figures (in excess of 900), which basically means that any future housing development in the town should be 'affordable or social housing' only, as there is little space for other types of development within the town boundaries. Of course this cannot be applied to developments that already have planning permission.

There is also information that assists with limiting the number of holiday and second homes within the conservation area – again this would only be for new builds and cannot be used for what already exists. But it may help in the future.

As is the way of these things the government has now decided to withdraw NDP funding in their spending review. So we wait to see what the next steps are and how the remainder of the Amble Plan can be funded. Working to keep plovers safe

For us here at the Space for Shorebirds team, the spring and summer months can be a very busy time of year indeed as we work to protect the endangered birds that come to our coast to nest, such as Ringed Plovers and Oystercatchers. These struggling shorebirds make their nests on sand and shingle beaches, where their eggs are fantastically well camouflaged to keep them hidden from hungry predators.

Unfortunately, this means that the eggs and chicks can be quite vulnerable on busy beaches, as the nests or chicks can be accidentally stepped on. Our population of Ringed Plovers in this country is falling worryingly quickly, so every fledged chick really matters to the future of these birds.


After a fantastic breeding year last year, this year our Plovers are really struggling to keep their eggs and chicks safe from predators, especially from Crows and other birds. The numbers of predators hunting at our nesting sites can go up and down year on year and this change can be due to lots of things. For example, if the predator is raising young nearby or if there has been a change in the amount of food they can find elsewhere, they might be more likely to come to these beaches looking for food.

While we are working hard to keep our plovers safe, it's more important than ever to keep disturbance from people to a minimum and give them the best chance possible. If you see any of our fenced areas on Northumberland's beaches, please remember to give them as much space as you can and to follow any signs you might find. And if you ever find a nest on a beach that doesn't have any protection, please let us know straight away at spaceforshorebirds.co.uk or through our social media.
